### Context:

Baden is an affluent town in Austria and the capital of the district of Baden in the province of Lower Austria, with a population of around 30,000. Located 26 km (16 mi) south of Vienna, it is also known as Baden bei Wien (“Baden near Vienna”) to distinguish it from other towns named Baden in neighboring countries.

Baden borders the Biosphere Park Wienerwald (Vienna Woods), a landscape that is under special protection by UNESCO, and has a long tradition of garden cultivation. With the participation of the community stakeholders, the municipality is taking action to preserve the biosphere in and around Baden.

Nearly 2,000 years ago, the Romans set up the first spa in Baden. Renowned for its hot sulfur-chlorine medicinal springs, Baden became part of the transnational UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2021 under the name “Great Spa Towns of Europe”.

Baden has contributed significantly to European and global culture. Ludwig van Beethoven, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Franz Schubert, Johann Strauss, and other classical music composers as well as world-renowned authors, playwrights, and painters spent parts of their working lives in Baden.

Beginning in the late 20th century, Baden increasingly became a suburb of Vienna and is now an important economic area of employment, retail trade, and services within the Viennese metropolitan area. As the administrative center of the district, Baden is the seat of regional authorities and public institutions, such as vocational schools and health care facilities.

The economy of Baden is characterized by the spa and conference business, winery and wine taverns in the surrounding area. The spa town is a popular health resort for curing rheumatic conditions.

Officials of the City of Baden are collaborating and cooperating to fulfill their role in the environmental and socioeconomic sustainability of the community. Together, the participating stakeholders are working toward a resilient and socially, environmentally and economically sustainable community.

The BuildAction initiative aims to foster constructive dialog between the different stakeholders, to ensure an objective, balanced and fact-based development of the local built environment, and to coordinate collective shareholder action.

Evaluation of the BuildAction initiative for stakeholder participation in community development assesses the success and effectiveness of the initiative in meeting its

objectives and its impact on the stakeholders and policymakers. Evaluation can provide a simple audit or a much deeper examination that considers what happened and why.

For an audit, a range of statistical methods are applied and data are collected to show whether targets have been met. The evaluation for internal learning uses qualitative methods to describe and illustrate the success and effectiveness of the individual projects and their impact.

Evaluation helps to clarify the objectives of the initiative and improve program management and accountability by transparently reporting the engagement by the stakeholders. Moreover, it should improve future practice and policy by developing hard facts and knowledge about what works and the impacts of the different features of the BuildAction toolkit for stakeholder participation in community affairs.

As the solution is intended for the long term, the participants are encouraged to report on their experience with the BuildAction toolkit. The tracking of the mechanisms and evaluation is an ongoing process.

In the final analysis, the effectiveness of BuildAction can be seen in the engagement of the stakeholders, their involvement and role in the community, and the action they take. Success is realized when the government authorities and officials collaborate with the private-sector stakeholders and citizenry.

Active participation of the City of Baden is called for in public discussions, meetings, and petitions addressed to the relevant government authorities. In addition to the mayor and

city officials, all members of the city council are called upon to engage with the community stakeholders in discussion and the coordination of collective action.

The petitions request specific action by the relevant government authorities and officials. Once received by the authority in proper form, the application is processed at their discretion. Moreover, the status of the application or other information is not disclosed to the applicant or the public until the matter has been decided.

The municipality collaborates and cooperates with the community citizens and other stakeholders, which is the intended impact. However, the BuildAction initiative and toolkit are not intended to impact the community's public policy.

BuildAction is an initiative of SEEDIS – Social, Environmental and Economic Development Intersector Solutions – for the sustainable development and use of land, buildings and infrastructure. SEEDIS supports citizens and other stakeholders in the built environment to encourage the sustainable development and operation of their communities.

Public participation in public policy processes and governance tends to be low and citizens are generally not included in what is being discussed and decided about their communities. BuildAction is an initiative to support communities to involve citizens and other interested stakeholders in the sustainable development of their communities.

The BuildAction participation toolkit enables municipalities to communicate, collaborate and cooperate with all interested stakeholders in the sustainable development and operation of communities and to coordinate collective action. It is a platform that complements existing or planned citizen participation initiatives of municipalities and is targeted at local and regional governments, private- and civil-sector enablers, and individual citizens.

In collaboration and cooperation with the City of Baden, BuildAction is enabling stakeholders to meet their civic duty to actively participate in community affairs. While facilitating citizen participation, the BuildAction toolkit also helps the local authorities and governments to fulfill their role and public duty to citizens.

Baden is the city chosen for the experience because of our personal relationships with the City of Baden. Not only is Baden where SEEDIS is based but it is also where we live and work. We are fully committed to contributing to its sustainable development for this and future generations and are participating in collective action taken in the community.

BuildAction enables stakeholders to take their commitment beyond words. BuildAction helps make this happen.
